Your group can get involved in the grass roots movement — originally based in song but expanded to other creative activities — fostering an ethic of sharing and understanding, and open hearted compassion towards the last and least. It's Second Saturdays... **Will you join in the song?** For business organizations that want to get involved, or for schools that want to do this midweek, and religious groups that celebrate Saturdays and keep it holy, we suggest Third Thursdays. How about Third Thursdays at Three, which is still in the middle of the workday and still during school? Your issue may be your local school, or 'Guitars not Guns' or helping runaways, or ending violence, or your issue may be ending childhood hunger. Around September 11<sup>th</sup>, your issue may be peace and harmony. We just know there's something that makes you passionate enough to get together for a better tomorrow. Consider a 'Second Saturday Singalongs' event. You can take it a new way – some have started 'Can Do' Second Saturdays, creatively collecting cans against hunger.
